
Weekly news at St Christopher's





Dear Parents,

As we reach the end of the half term, I wanted to thank Mrs. West and Mrs. Wanstall for holding the fort so admirably while I was away last week. Their dedication and hard work ensured that everything

ran smoothly in my absence, and I couldn't be more thankful for their support.

Speaking of last week, spending time in Dorset with Year 4 was an absolute delight. Seeing the children outside the classroom environment was not only enjoyable but also incredibly illuminating. It's fascinating to observe another side of the students as they interact with their peers and navigate new experiences. I also very much enjoyed visiting the Year 5 at Bowles this week, for the very same reason, although it seems every year for the past three years, I get there and it rains. I am clearly the bringer of bad weather, as they had experienced glorious sun the day before!

Reflecting on both of these trips, I thought it would be worthwhile to share that the primary aim of our residential trips goes beyond academic learning. These excursions are designed to impart vital life lessons, particularly in fostering independence and organisational skills. When children are away from home and the safe, structured environment you so lovingly create, they face the challenge of managing their belongings and taking responsibility for themselves. It was eve-opening to see how many found this quite a task and how much they learned in those three days. As adults, we often step in to manage various aspects of our children's lives, sometimes without giving them the opportunity to fail, learn, and develop essential skills. On the residentials, the children had to navigate tasks like changing beds, sitting at the dinner table until everyone had finished eating, or helping to tidy up after meals. These might seem simple, but they teach valuable lessons in responsibility and cooperation, and it's these tasks that the children found challenging. Additionally, many of the children found joy in tasks like vacuuming their rooms with Henry the Hoover before we left Dorset, which made me wonder how often they are asked to contribute to household chores at home. Not for monetary

rewards, but simply to be helpful and to play a part in family life.

In our modern era, these small yet significant tasks are often overlooked. It may seem nostalgic or perhaps rather rose-tinted of me, but these were expectations when I was a child as I imagine many of these were for you, and the skills and expectations remain valuable today and will serve our children well in the future. If I took away anything from the trip, apart from how much I enjoyed being with the pupils, it was my hope that you also see the need for this and continue fostering these life skills at home, helping your children grow into responsible and capable individuals.

We have finalised our staffing for next year. As you know, I believe it's important for teachers and teaching assistants to avoid remaining in the same year group for too long, as it can lead to institutionalism. Continuous professional learning is crucial for teachers to remain effective practitioners. Research indicates that transitioning between year groups significantly enhances professional learning, providing an opportunity for growth that strengthens practice and pedagogy. The staff list for next year will appear later in the newsletter. In addition to the staffing grid, we are excited to welcome Ms. Williams as our new Art/ DT teacher who brings a lot of skills from a variety of teaching backgrounds, as well as working as a children's book illustrator. We also have new teaching assistants joining us: in Year 4, Mrs. Dorman and Aldridge, and our maternity cover TA in Year 1 while Miss James is away, Mrs Baklanov. All of these TAs have a wealth of experience in schools and we are delighted to have their expertise joining our team. Mrs. Dodd will be joining the Learning Enrichment team next year to support and enrich groups across the school. In addition, Miss Atkinson will also be leaving at the end of the year to explore new avenues, and our best wishes go with her along with our thanks for all she has done for the School.


I hope you enjoy the half-term. Let's hope for sun and warm weather!

We played on the beach, which was a highlight for many, and learnt about how coastal erosion happened, and sand dunes were formed. We even got to play in a huge sand dune. To finish the excursion we were able to buy an ice cream and eat it with our friends on the beach.



Lots of new learning took place from a Geographical element as well as those vital life skills. 
